By his own estimation “ he was a just bridge builder”. The many bridges along the highways and by-ways of Northland can attest to that. But more was in-store for the man who would rise to the lofty rank of Knight Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit - Tā Hekenukumai Ngaiwi Puhipi.

Widely-accredited for reviving traditional Māori voyaging practices, he sailed more than 30,000 nautical miles to every Polynesian island as well as making three circumnavigations of the North Island since 1992.

Matua Hek is acknowledged as carving a total of 52 traditional waka, but his greatest achievement was the establishment of the Kupe Waka Centre, based at Te Aurere. Bouts of ill-health did not deter his dogged determination to see the centre come to fruition. His vision was to share the knowledge and experience of ocean-going waka sailing and celestial navigation. He believed this knowledge was an integral part of New Zealand’s cultural heritage and needed to be shared. The centre celebrates and heroes the waka hourua and its role in the peopling of Aotearoa, like much of Polynesia, Micronesia, and Melanesia.

About two kilometres up a dirt road, you reach a clearing. A grassy hill, bordered by a warehouse, a carved whare, a waka hourua resting under a tarpaulin, and a house that has been extended several times looking out onto the expanse of Doubtless Bay.

On top of the emerald green, grassy hill is a circle of pou. And inside the ring sits Papa Hec on a seat next to his golf cart. The vista of Doubtless Bay is breath taking from here. The circle is actually a compass. Each of the 32 pou, set 11 degrees apart represent a direction, and as he begins to swivel in his chair, you realise that through his own design Sir Hector has fashioned a working compass, complete with adjustable sights to study the night sky. Here he studied the stars and honed his celestial navigation learning the matauranga of wayfinding and navigating using the sun, stars, clouds and other natural indicators.

The “bridge builder’s” involvement with waka went back to his youth when he crewed the waka Ngātokimatawhaorua. His quest to revive ocean voyaging was sparked by the arrival in Aotearoa of the Hawaiian sailing canoe Hōkūle'a in 1985 and a challenge by Sir James Henare that Māori should also return to the ocean. Ten years later a waka hourua built and sailed by Sir Hekenukumai Ngaiwi completed the return voyage to Tahiti and Hawai'i, fulfilling Sir James' dream.

Matua Hector was a noted exponent of kapa haka, carving and mau rākau. He was the first life member of the Aotearoa Traditional Maori Performing Arts Society now known as Te Matatini. He used his building skills to erect the stage in 1988 for the National Kapa Haka competitions held at Okara Park. More recently, true to form he had a design already to go, to build an atāmira that was transportable for use around the country.

Matua Hector was appointed as a Knight Companion of the Order of Merit in the Queen's Birthday Honours - bestowed at Waitangi in February 2019.

In later life he continued to build bridges of a different sort bringing together peoples of the Pacific and countries throughout the world. This was evidenced in the many delegations that came to pay their respects to Papa Hector at his tangi.

Tā Hekenukumai was disappointed that due to ill-health he was not able to attend Te Matatini ki te Ao. So the three Senior representative roopu to Te Matatini ki te Ao; Muriwhenua, Te Puu Ao and Hātea together with the Waitangi Cultural Society organised Te Toki Nui o Kupe, an evening to honour and celebrate Matua Hector, his knighthood and remarkable lifetime achievements, with him in attendance. Aptly an evening of waiata, haka and aroha, fit for the most celebrated son of Te Uri o Hina, Te Rarawa.

Tā Hekenukumai Ngaiwi Puhipi pulled up anchor and left us destined for a distant shore on May 11 2019

NGĀ MAHARA TE HEMANAWA OLIVE (Hema) TEMARA



Hema was the oldest of her siblings. Her parents were Te Paea Whitu and Tapu Teepa. She learnt a lot of her history and kōrero from her Grandparents Rawinia Te Maitaranui Rangiaho and Wi Whitu and was basically raised by her grandparents. Hema was married to Te Rangia William (Pou) Temara and had 4 children.

Hema began a teaching career in secondary schools after gaining tertiary qualifications in the early 80s. She taught Te Reo Māori at Sacred Heart College, Taita College, Naenae College and Wellington High School. She was an active tutor in kapa haka during her teaching years at those colleges.

In 1992 she began a career in the education section of Te Papa and worked in various roles during her tenure. Her last position was Marae Tikanga Co-ordinator for Te Papa until her departure in late 2017. One of her passions at Te Papa was to repatriate our tīpuna held in overseas institutions and lead the tikanga surrounding their return...something her Grandfather Wi Whitu was an expert in exhuming and re-locating human remains.

Kapa Haka

Hema was one of the founders of Tuhoe ki Poneke Kapa Haka which started in 1970. The meetings between Te Tira Hou (Tuhoe ki Akarana) was held in Rotorua in 1970 at Mataatua Marae, formed the basis of Te Hui Ahurei a Tūhoe, as it is known today. She had performed at nearly every ahurei until the late 1990s.

Hema and her two daughters (Puti & Tauwhiri) were active kapa haka members for Pukeahu from 1991-1992, performing at the Wellington Regional competitions and at Ngāruawāhia in 1992. In 1993, Tūhoe ki Poneke / Tu Te Maungaroa decided to stand in the Wellington Regional Competitions for the first time and won it outright. Pou and Hema were the tutors and Manukura Tane/Wahine during their tenure. Their first national standing in Hawera 1994 saw the group placed 6th overall with a first placing in the waiata-a-ringa 'Te Aumāngea.'

Hema was dedicated to her kapa haka group and inspired them through teaching and kōrero of histories pertaining to Tūhoe. She held the position of 'Chair' of the Wellington Māori Cultural Society for several years before retiring from that position.

Her knowledge of Tikanga and Mātauranga Māori was second to none. She was seen as a Māreikura in her field of karanga and always had the backing of her many hapū and iwi and had the respect of other iwi around the motu in terms of her tenacious leadership.

Kapa Haka is an art form with a special status that has a unique contribution to the wellbeing of Aotearoa New Zealand. Embodying all that is commonly associated with a performing art, Kapa Haka is also a proven and successful platform that materially assists the retention of Māori culture and language. Kapa Haka's steadily increasing global profile identifies strongly with Aotearoa New Zealand's international brand and profile: unique, indigenous, and authentic.

The major highlight of the year was the spectacle that was Te Matatini ki te Ao 2019 Festival. The biennial festival is the premiere Māori Kapa Haka event that brings in a much needed economic boost to any town or city that chooses to host it. The 2019 Te Matatini festival was hosted by Wellington Māori Culture Society and Te Matatini Society Incorporated. Together we managed a very successful competition with new teams not only making it to the top 9 but also a new winner of the Te Matatini Festival. This shows the high caliber of performances and competitive nature that continues to develop year to year.

The Ministry of Education sponsored 3105 tickets for students who participated in regional competitions in Wellington and Māori boarding schools. We were also able to provide a VIP experience for 1200 kaumatua over a 4 day period. There were a record breaking 42,000 festival attendees hosted at Westpac Stadium in Wellington, with a staggering viewership of 278,000 watching via live stream, 292,000 watching on demand and 230,000 using the Te Matatini mobile app. Our re-branded Haka Translate (formerly known as Hakarongo Mai) was extremely popular at this year's Te Matatini festival with an astounding 68,000 listeners tuning in over the 4 days.

Te Matatini are extremely proud of the new relationships we have made with Air New Zealand, Te Mātāwai, One Foundation, Te Wānanga o Raukawa and Victoria University of Wellington. Not forgetting too, our continuing strategic partners; Te Puni Kōkiri, Ministry of Education, Te Taura Whiri i te Reo Māori, The University of Waikato, Te Puia – New Zealand Māori Arts & Crafts Institute and Te Wānanga o Aotearoa. It was an honour and a privilege to lead the Festival for yet another successful year.

Our ultimate aim is for Te Matatini to become an integral and inclusive part of whānau, hapū and iwi where we are all able to say, "Ko au ko Te Matatini, ko Te Matatini ko au."

TE MATATINI – A YEAR IN REVIEW

Te Matatini Festival 2019

The Te Matatini team worked tirelessly in the lead up to and during the Festival and express appreciation to all who contributed to its success. We wish to acknowledge the Wellington Māori Cultural Society, hosts of the event and army of volunteers for their commitment to the kaupapa. We also pay tribute to our strategic partners and sponsors. The financial investments and in-kind contributions made over the year for Te Matatini business as usual and for Te Matatini ki te Ao are vital to the sustainability of Te Matatini for generations to come.

Strategic Partners and Sponsors

Other guests included Chairs and CEO's of our strategic partners and sponsors. A contingent from Hawaii, hosts of the next Festival of Pacific Arts (FESTPAC 2020) was hosted by Creative NZ. The festival provided an opportunity to expose these national leaders and overseas manuhiri to our rich culture, New Zealand's wonderful indigenous performing artform.

Community Kapa Haka Initiatives

We continue to support rohe in the delivery of Kapa Haka experiences that are inclusive across age groups for diverse audiences. We also supported all qualifying teams from 13 regions to compete in the National Kapa Haka Festival while also providing financial management training to rohe kōmiti.

We have continued to promote our 10-year Strategic Plan to rohe and promote initiatives to achieve intergenerational growth, wellbeing and economic sustainability. We also plan to undertake a longitudinal research project to illustrate the benefits of Kapa Haka with this work scheduled to be completed by June 2020.

We have promoted ongoing research to assess business needs and improve efficiencies. We actively promote the revitalisation of Te Reo Māori through the development of our Māori language strategy that will be embedded in all Te Matatini mahi. The implementation of the National Kapa Haka Festival survey and reports will provide data to continuously improve our services. We will continue to pursue sponsorship opportunities and cultural partnership and have supported iwi within Te Whanganui-a-Tara region to deliver their National Kapa Haka Festival host responsibilities.

We aim to inspire and encourage youth to progress through Kapa Haka career pathways and continue to build and strengthen our rangatahi outreach at events such as the 2018 Ngā Kapa Haka Kura Tuarua o Aotearoa. We endeavor to enhance youth leadership and Kapa Haka participation through Youth Development programmes.

We were able to strengthen visibility of Te Matatini brand beyond the National Kapa Haka Festival and through international exposure promoting traditional Māori performing arts. The promotion of Kapa Haka is integral to the promotion of NZ Inc internationally. Our ongoing engagement with government agencies continues to increase Te Matatini's profile.



We continue to improve access to Kapa Haka content via digital media and through collaborative projects with government agencies and like-minded organisations to raise the Te Matatini profile. With increased visibility the Te Matatini brand will be strengthened beyond festival.

Te Matatini Scholarships

Scholarship funding for Kapa Haka provides valuable support to those students who pursue rangahau (research) projects which benefits the pursuit of Kapa Haka excellence and Māori wellbeing within a Wānanga Institution. On behalf of Te Matatini we wish to convey our appreciation to Te Wānanga o Aotearoa, Te Wānanga o Raukawa and Te Whare Wānanga o Awanuiārangī, who implement a rigorous process in house for these scholarships.

Te Pītau Whakarei

Te Pītau Whakarei is Te Matatini's ten-year strategic plan with 2019 bringing in the second year since its inception. Eight key focus areas remain constant within the plan with the result areas deliberately fit for purpose to help Te Matatini to achieve its strategic aspirations to promote excellence in the traditional Māori performing arts genre.

Te Matatini focus in 2019 was centred on management and operation actions aligned to the strategic objectives of Te Pītau Whakarei and the 2019 festival. The national Board also identified three overarching areas for 2019 which included rohe development, business growth and whānau wellbeing. Critical to our rohe development strategy is recognition and acknowledging that working with our rohe kōmiti and Kapa Haka teams to ensure that our investment was aligned with Te Matatini priorities, rohe priorities, and government trends and challenges. Te Matatini remained committed to working with our 13 rohe kōmiti and delegates to develop and strengthen Kapa Haka throughout Aotearoa. This included provision of financial management training resources to help develop rohe capacity and financial support.

The National Board also acknowledged the unique nature of rohe mahi and the need for rohe to maintain its independence and autonomy, therefore placing more emphasis on outputs rather than activity actions.



LOOKING FORWARD

Kapa Haka is an inherent part of the fabric of Aotearoa. Te Matatini will continue to champion this notion in defining the identity of New Zealand.

Te Matatini workstreams for 2019/20 will be implemented through detailed planning, transparent decision-making processes and the prudent management of funds. A key focus will be on strong sustainable growth of Te Matatini as an organisation, and the promotion and strengthening of traditional Māori performing arts as a preeminent art form in Aotearoa and for the world stage.

Planning is underway for Te Matatini 2021, with both the venue and dates for the festival confirmed already. We have identified a number of other key events that will take place in Tāmaki Makaurau. These events pose as key opportunities to enhance current business relationships and to introduce Kapa Haka and extend its reach to other global audiences attending events such as the America's Cup and APEC.

Kapa Haka Research

One of our flagship initiatives over 2019/20 will be to lead a major indigenous research project with our tertiary education partners; Ngā Pae o te Maramatanga, New Zealand's Māori Centre for Research Excellence; Te Wānanga o Raukawa, Victoria University of Wellington, Te Whare Wānanga o Awanuiārangī and the University of Waikato. This research will be embedded with a focus on Te Reo Māori that will guide the three research focus areas of this project which will investigate the:

1. fiscal contribution that Kapa Haka makes to the national economy
2. positive contribution that Kapa Haka makes to the Māori health index
3. increase in the academic achievement levels of students actively participating in Kapa Haka

The overarching focus is the contribution Kapa Haka makes towards the revitalisation of Te Reo Māori. The expected outcome of this research will highlight the disparity in cultural funding and provide a solution to equitable funding.

Te Mitatini: Whiua ki te Ao

There is ongoing development of Te Matatini's Māori language strategy, Te Mitatini: Whiua ki te Ao. Threading through all of Te Matatini's current work, community development and future business growth will be a tangible commitment to expressing the Māori cultural foundations of te reo and tikanga that are an essential part of Kapa Haka.

Youth Leadership Development Programme

Succession and future leadership will be a focus for our planned rangatahi forums. Te Matatini will build on the initial pilot programme which launched in 2018 where Kapa Haka was a foundation for creating a learning environment for young Māori to connect with their own unique leadership qualities. The Youth Leadership Development Programme will focus on secondary age students whom have a keen interest and actively participate in Kapa Haka.

Kapa Haka Events

Continuously improving our festival systems and processes for the betterment of our events is vital with the review of the competition rules taking place in the first quarter to meet the senior regionals timelines. Te Matatini view a best practice philosophy and culture in event management imperative to the continued success of our events and have commenced working alongside the tangata whenua and stakeholders in Auckland in planning and organising the national Kapa Haka Festival 2021.



TE MATATINI CHAMPIONS 2019

Kapa Haka forms a unique part of our national identity and contributes positively to the wellbeing of the country and all New Zealanders. Capably led by Reikura Kahi and Kawariki Morgan, their achievement is historic as they are the first kapa haka consisting of raukura from Te Kohanga Reo and Kura Kaupapa Māori.

Te Matatini congratulate Ngā Tumanako who are also inaugural winners of the Ngāpō Pīmia Wehi Duncan McIntyre trophy and are proud to have the opportunity to work with Te Toa Whakaihuwaka to take their message to the world.

According to Angus & Associates, Te Matatini ki Te Ao 2019 was another highly successful event that has left a positive impression for a majority of those who attended. The report shows that 60% of attendees had attended their first Te Matatini Festival - almost reaching a 50% increase of previous events. It also showed that attendees from our rohe were significantly higher than previous benchmarks with 50% of attendees being local to this region.

We can all be extremely proud of our achievements to date. The Society along with local iwi injected an enormous \$790,000.00 (including donations in kind) into the Hosting of Te Matatini 2019 and should be celebrated by us all as this figure does not include the \$600,000.00 given directly to Te Matatini from our local Mayoral Fund.

To our strategic sponsor 'Wellington Community Trust' and corporate sponsors – Te Puni Kōkiri, E Tū Whānau, Greater Wellington Regional Council and the Tindall Foundation. TE MATATINI FESTIVAL 2019 HIGHLIGHTS

‘Kapa Haka is the home where our values as a nation can thrive. It’s our place to stand and express who we are and our pride as tangata whenua’.

Te Matatini ki te Ao 2019 is now filed in the memories, hearts and minds of our kapa haka whānau. They will be contemplating what could have, should have, might have been but one thing is for sure, Te Matatini remains a constant, as the iconic national festival and exemplar of kapa haka in the world. It is on this note that we take a moment to reflect on this outstanding event and take in the highlights.

In particular we will discuss the strands of information about the economic impact on Te Whanganui a Tara region and draw alignment to Te Matatini strategic aspirations. The information will highlight Te Mitatini, introduced specifically by Te Matatini to support, enhance and increase the revitalisation of Te Reo Māori.

To close out the report we will also acknowledge the ‘many faces’ that are Te Matatini and with all event best practice, will consider improvements for Te Matatini 2021 into the future. To conclude, we will provide the financial results and indicate the return on investment (ROI) achieved. The data recorded and tables highlighted have been drawn out of the Independent Survey conducted by Angus & Associates.

Pōwhiri

The pōwhiri proved to be a wonderful experience for all, and more particularly for those members of the public who were witnessing a pōwhiri for the first time. The wero showed the unique tikanga qualities of the local iwi, Te Ātiawa, Ngāti Toa and Ngāti Raukawa. A proud moment for local iwi and the Wellington Māori Cultural Society and their collective communities.

Te Matatini Reo Strategy – Te Mitatini

Te Mitatini has evolved as part of Te Matatini’s commitment to the revitalisation of Te Reo Māori and in recognition that Kapa Haka serves as a powerful vehicle to rejuvenate the Māori language. Te Matatini ki te Ao proved to be an important gateway to implement the AHEIHA te Reo initiative to ‘right-shift’ non-speakers of Te Reo Māori to begin their journey in te reo. Highlights resulting from the project are listed below:

- 56 stallholders provided with translation support
- AHEIHA! Kapaoke section received the highest audience engagement.
- 143,000 audience engagement across AHEIHA social media platforms
- 70 Tūao Reo recruited to help support the market place
- 50,000+ audience engagement in the AHEIHA! Kapaoke Competition.


Haka Translate

Haka Translate (formerly HakarongoMai) was another service provided by Te Matatini. This translation portal has been operating for seven consecutive Te Matatini festivals and has allowed all New Zealanders and non-speakers of te reo Māori to participate and engage in Te Matatini ki te Ao. This year saw the inclusion of Mandarin for the first time.

An independent review of the quality of the Haka Translate broadcast was conducted by Te Māngai Pāhō.

The review measured the announcer’s broadcast skills across a matrix of eight characteristics and each scored on a scale between 1 – 5, with 5 being the highest. All four Haka Translate English announcers scored a rating of 5 across all eight characteristics.

The analytics evidence shows a total of 150,806 viewers/listeners accessed the service across all Haka Translate platforms during the four days of the event.




Maihi Karauna

The successful launch of the Government’s new Māori Language Strategy was held during Te Matatini ki te Ao revealing the key objectives of the strategy which are to promote the revitalisation of Te Reo Māori through the development of a Māori language strategy and secondly to engage with agencies responsible for the delivery of the Government’s Maihi Karauna Māori language strategy where relevant. Te Matatini was pleased to be involved and work alongside our strategic partners Te Mātāwai, Te Taura Whiri i te Reo Māori, Victoria University of Wellington and other sponsors, ACC and the Heartland Bank on this important initiative.

Festival Attendance

The attendance for 2019 Festival was slightly down from the previous festival but the revenue forecast was achieved. It was also exciting to note that at previous festivals the majority of attendees were repeat visitors, but at Te Matatini 2019 this trend reversed with 60% of attendees attending a Te Matatini festival for the first time.




Tickets

Te Matatini 2019 highlighted very similar ticket purchasing profiles compared to the benchmark of previous festivals. 90% of attendees to the 2019 festival had purchased the tickets themselves or had someone else purchase them. This suggests positive development as there was an increased percentage of attendees paying to attend the festival.


Days Attended

Te Matatini 2019 saw lower attendance or involvement with each event day when compared with the benchmark of the last four festivals. Competition Day 3 saw almost two thirds of attendees attending on this day, the most popular day this year. Further analysis of this data reveals that a large proportion of attendees only attended one day of the Festival.



Overall Satisfaction

Te Matatini 2019 received an overall audience satisfaction rating of 8.1 (on a scale of 0 to 10). On average, overall satisfaction was higher among spectators than those involved in the festival. This year's event saw over 50% answer nine or ten out of ten for overall satisfaction.




Repeat Attendance and Advocacy

The data recorded in the independent survey conducted by Angus & Associates were asked to indicate how likely it was that they would attend a Te Matatini National Kapa Haka Festival again in the future, and how likely it was that they would recommend the Festival to people they knew. It was pleasing to note that Te Matatini 2019 attendees were highly inclined to attend another festival in the future with an average of 9.1 out of ten recorded. On average those involved in this year's festival indicate that they are more likely to return than spectators.

Social and Cultural Impact

To better understand the social and cultural impacts of Te Matatini 2019, survey respondents were shown several statements and asked "to what extent do you agree or disagree that these apply to Te Matatini 2019 – Wellington and your own experience at the event?"



Te Matatini 2019 was rated most highly for bringing people together and increasing eventgoers' interest in Māori culture. It also rated highly for helping to expand attendees' knowledge of Māori culture and Māori arts.

Economic Impact

To establish a comprehensive view of the economic contribution generated by the Te Matatini Festival to the Wellington region, the following aspects were taken into consideration:

- Visitor expenditure in Wellington while attending the festival
- Team expenditure in Wellington
- Stakeholder expenditure in Wellington
- Te Matatini Expenditure in Wellington

Visitor Expenditure

Results show that visitors to Wellington attending Te Matatini 2019 - Wellington as their main reason to visit the region spent, on average \$827.10 (with the top 1% of expenditure in each category has been excluded from the results, removing major outliers in the data). By attendee type (also with 1% of outliers removed), spectators/whānau support, who make up the majority of attendees, averaged a total spend of just under \$800. Those part of a team spent close to a thousand dollars each, while volunteers/workers & stall/exhibitors averaged nearly \$1,400.

Wellington Economic Impact

Supplemented with data from Te Matatini to best estimate the number of attendees, average expenditure in region is extrapolated to estimate total economic contribution of attendees. The total visitor numbers used below for total expenditure calculations represent the number of unique attendees for the attendee group who visited Wellington to attend Te Matatini 2019. (Formula: average expenditure per person x total visitor numbers (n=) = total attendee expenditure)

Stakeholder Impact

Key Te Matatini 2019 - Wellington stakeholders were asked to complete a survey to capture expenditure that would not otherwise have occurred in Wellington if the Festival had not taken place. In total, n=10 stakeholders responded, and in total, estimated that \$222,250 was spent in Wellington that would not have otherwise occurred if it were not for the Festival.

While there are more than 10 stakeholders, this data has not been extrapolated across all stakeholders due to the varying relationship and involvement of stakeholders to Te Matatini 2019 - Wellington. \$222,250 can be seen as a conservative estimate of stakeholder expenditure in Wellington.

Event Organiser Economic Impact

Considerable expenditure is undertaken by event organisers to deliver an event on the scale of Te Matatini National Kapa Haka Festival. From staging, sound systems and venue hire, to promotion and accommodation, a significant amount of expenditure is incurred by Te Matatini event organisers, majority of which occurring in the region the event is held. This year saw \$2.72 million of the total \$2.9 million event expenditure occurring in Wellington.

Total Economic Impact

Factoring the various forms of expenditure associated with Te Matatini 2019 - Wellington, the total economic contribution to the Wellington region comes to an estimate of \$15.30 million. The graph highlights the collective figures that contribute to this figure.

The 2018-2019 year has seen a number of key milestones achieved, particularly with respect to broadcasting. Some of this year’s highlights include:

- (a) Increased distribution of licence fees for Ngā Kapa Haka Kura Tuarua 2018;
- (b) Increased distribution of licence fees for Te Matatini ki te Ao 2019;
- (c) Increased HakaTranslate viewership by almost 300%.

The successes enjoyed over the last 12 months have been the culmination of the tireless efforts of AKHL staff, contractors and volunteers and the valuable contributions of key strategic partners. The AKHL Board of Directors wishes to acknowledge Te Māngai Pāho, Māori Television Services and Iwi Radio for their continued support of and ongoing investment in kapa haka.

With the development of a new and exciting 5-year strategic plan underway, AKHL is set to move into new territory through the diversification of its service offerings and by forging new strategic partnerships to help grow its core business. The strategic plan seeks to solidify AKHL’s commitment to the growth and development of kapa haka excellence both nationally and abroad.

AKHL looks forward to the exciting times ahead and welcomes the opportunity to showcase to the world the best that kapa haka has to offer.



Regional Committees


Te Matatini is made up of 13 regional committees supporting over 130 Kapa Haka teams. These regions cover the whole of Aotearoa New Zealand and Australia.



This momentous occasion will be recorded in history as the first kapa haka consisting of raukura from Te Kohanga Reo and Kura Kaupapa Māori representing Hoani Waititi Marae becoming the inaugural champions of the Ngāpō Pīmia Wehi Duncan McIntyre taonga whakamaumahara. Kāore i kō atu, kāore i kō mai!

- July 2018: Te Taumata Kapa Haka hosted Waihirere in a showcase of wahine rangatira in te ao haka over many years.
- September 2018: Tāmaki Kapa haka, Auckland Council and mana whenua host Te Matatini executive committee on a tour of potential venues for Te Matatini 2021.
- October 2018: Te Ahurea Tino Rangatiratanga
- Te Wā O Te Raumati: Preparations for Te Matatini ki te Ao by Ngā Tumanako, Te Waka Huia, Te Manu Huia, Te Taha Tū and Te Roopū Manutaki.
- November 2018: Qualifying regionals for Mana Kuratahi. Six kura will travel to Tainui in November 2019 to represent Tāmaki Makaurau.
- March 2019: Polyfest. Division one was postponed due to Christchurch mosque massacre and resulted in another successful event. 2020 may be the last time the Māori stage is part of the Polyfest due to the whenua it is held on being developed for housing and conflicts with the management of Polyfest.

Kapa Haka Growth

- Tāmaki Makaurau Senior Kapa haka regionals had a total of nineteen kapa haka, many the result of working directly with communities that are likely to host kapa haka in 2021.
- Wānanga held for more than 70 kura tuarua as they prepare for our two secondary school kapa haka festivals.
- Wānanga held for more than 40 kura tuarua prior to the regional competition.

The Main Goals for Our Rohe for 2018-2019

- Ngā Tumanako to continue the high standards when representing Te Matatini, Aotearoa, their own whānau, hapū and iwi as they travel internationally to Shanghai in November 2019 and Hawaii in March 2020.
- Sharing Te Mauri O Te Matatini with the marae of Tāmaki Makaurau to engage communities and celebrate ngā korero o ngā tupuna.
- Coordinating a wānanga for te reo me ōna tikanga training for a 1,000+ volunteer workforce for Te Matatini 2021.
- Provide wānanga for a Tāmaki Makaurau Kapa Haka mass kapa haka performance at events of significance leading up to Te Matatini 2021.

TE ARAWA – Dan Vaka

Key Highlights

- One of Te Arawa’s highlights for the year was proudly having 6 Kapa Haka representing at Te Matatini ki te Ao in Te Whanganui a Tara with 3 of those Kapa making ‘Matangirua’- Top 9.
- Te Arawa Kapa Haka Committee were proud to be able to financially support all 6 Kapa competing at Te Matatini by applying for and receiving funding to assist with each Kapa’s campaign for Te Matatini.
- The development & implementation of a Te Arawa judging training platform has this year seen more younger judges come through to acquire and develop judging skills beginning at Primary Regional level, Secondary School’s Regional level, through to National School levels and Senior Regional level(s).

Rohe Events

The 66th annual consecutive Tamararo was held for Seniors, Juniors and Primary.

The return of Te Kapa Haka o Te Whānau a Kai seniors after an absence of over 5 years provided impact and earned the roopu second place at Tamararo, plus qualifying to Te Matatini ki Te Ao.

The Tairawhiti Primary Schools Kapahaka festival attracts over 70 roopu each year and is represented by primary schools, kohanga reo, play centres and childcare centres. The event attracts over 3,000 performers and is held in November over 5 days at the Gisborne Showgrounds Events Centre. The highlight is a mass kapahaka performance at the conclusion of the hui

Kapa Haka Growth

The growth of kapa haka is based around the annual Tamararo Kapa haka Competition. In this period the following numbers are provided in respect of participation

There is consistency annually and a willingness to participate in the Tamararo kaupapa. The key factor in this period is the number of kura who performed in the Primary section and travelled long distances. Commitment is acknowledged along with time and distance which is up to a 14 hour day for 4 of these rōpū.

The Main Goals for Our Rohe for 2018-2019

The goal of the Tairawhiti Cultural Development Trust is to focus on the report completed to develop our Strategic direction. This will provide a comprehensive overview of the current status of kapa haka in Tairawhiti and will be the focus of wānanga to determine sound outcomes in all areas from 2019 and beyond.

TE TAITOKERAU – Pauline Hopa

Key Highlights

3 rōpū to Te Matatini ki te Ao was the pinnacle achievement. Muriwhenua, Hātea and Te Puu Ao summoned ngā kōunga o te kainga to display and invigorate interest.

However, Te Matatini ki te Ao left us dissatisfied with the inconsistencies of the current judging system and that the arena to present the best showcase of Kapa Haka was not fit for purpose. Being susceptible to the vagaries of weather and technical issues makes us question whether Te Matatini is seriously focussed on the art form. The advent of 2021 being at another sports stadium means more of the same.

While we crave the innovation, excitement and beauty of Te Matatini we must give serious thought to how we honour the art form of Kapa Haka.

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

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Statement of Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity

Te Matatini Society Incorporated (the "Society") is registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

These financial statements incorporate Te Matatini Incorporated Society (the controlling entity) and its subsidiary undertaking Aotearoa Kapa Haka Limited - together referred to as the 'Group'.

The Group is involved in the promotion of Kapa Haka for the benefit of Māori and tikanga Māori. The Society's primary objective is to provide these services for the social benefit of people and organisations and not for financial return to equity holders. For this reason it is designated as a Public Benefit Entity (PBE).

Basis of preparation

(a) Statement of compliance

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice ("NZ GAAP"). They comply with Public Benefit Entity International Public Sector Accounting Standards ("PBE IPSAS") and other applicable Financial Reporting Standards, as appropriate for Tier 2 not-for-profit public benefit entities, for which all reduced disclosure regime exemptions have been adopted.

The Group qualifies as a Tier 2 reporting entity as for the two most recent reporting periods it has had between \$2m and \$30m operating expenditure.

These financial statements were authorised for issue by the Executive Committee on 25 October 2019.

(b) Measurement Base

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical costs basis.

(c) Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars (\$) which is the controlling entity's functional and Group's presentation currency, rounded to the nearest dollar (\$'s).

There has been no change in the functional currency of the Group during the year.

Use of judgements and estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

(a) Judgements

Judgements made in applying accounting policies that have had the most significant effects on the amounts recognised in the consolidated financial statements include the following:

- Whether there is control (or not) over an investee
- Whether there is joint control (or not) over an investee
- Whether there is significant influence (or not) over an investee

(b) Assumptions and estimation uncertainties

Assumptions and estimation uncertainties applied in the financial statements include the following:

- Key assumptions underlying determining the recoverable amounts for impairment testing
- Useful life, recoverable amount, depreciation/amortisation method and rate
- Residual value of Mahau.

Significant Accounting Policies

The following particular accounting policies, which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position, have been applied:

Basis of consolidation

i. Business combinations

Business combinations are accounted for using the acquisition method as at the acquisition date, which is the date on which control is transferred to the Group.

The Group controls an entity when it has the power to govern the financial and operating policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities. In assessing control, the Group takes into consideration potential voting rights that are currently exercisable.

ii. Joint ventures

Joint ventures are those entities over whose activities the Group has joint control, established by a binding agreement and requiring unanimous consent for strategic financial and operating decisions.

Joint ventures that are not structured in a separate vehicle are classified as either jointly-controlled-operations or jointly controlled assets. The consolidated financial statements include the Group's share of assets, liabilities, expenses, and revenues from the jointly-controlled-operation or jointly controlled asset on a line-by-line basis.

iii. Transactions eliminated on consolidation

Intra-group balances and transactions, and any unrealised income and expenses arising from intra-group transactions, are eliminated in preparing the consolidated financial statements.

Unrealised gains arising from transactions with equity accounted associates and jointly-controlled-entities are eliminated against the investment to the extent of the Group's interest in the investee.

Unrealised losses are eliminated in the same way as unrealised gains, but only to the extent that there is no evidence of impairment.

Subsidiary and jointly controlled operations

Aotearoa Kapa Haka Limited is a 100% owned subsidiary (production company) of the Society. The company was incorporated on 7 May 2004.

An agreement with New Zealand Māori Arts & Crafts Incorporated gives Te Matatini joint ownership of the Mahau asset. The agreement also provides for the sharing of costs and revenues on a 50:50 basis.

Revenue

The Society derives income through the provision of outputs for the Crown through the Ministry of Culture and Heritage for services to third parties, and income from its investments. Such income is recognised when earned and is reported in the financial period to which it relates.

Revenue is recognised when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably and it is probable that economic benefits will flow to the Group, and measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to the Group's revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised.

i. Revenue from exchange services

Provision of services

Revenue from services rendered is recognised in surplus or deficit when the service is rendered.

Amounts received in advance for services to be provided in future periods are recognised as a liability until such time as the service is provided.

Grants are recognised as revenue when the conditions associated with the grants have been fulfilled.

ii. Revenue from non-exchange transactions

Non-exchange transactions are those where the Group receives an inflow of resources (i.e. cash and other tangible or intangible items) but provides no (or nominal) direct consideration in return.

With the exception of services-in-kind, inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions are only recognised as assets where both:

- It is probable that the associated future economic benefit or service potential will flow to the entity, and
- Fair value is reliably measurable.

Volunteer services received are not recognised as the fair value of the services are not able to be reliably measured.

Liabilities are recognised in relation to inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transactions, where both:

- It is probable that an outflow of resources embodying future economic benefit or service potential will be required to settle the obligation, and
- The amount of the obligation can be reliably estimated.

Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefit liabilities are recognised when the Group has a legal or constructive obligation to remunerate employees for services provided with 12 months of reporting date, and is measured on an undiscounted basis and expensed in the period in which employment services are provided.

Financial instruments

The Group initially recognises financial instruments when the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

The Group derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred. Any interest in transferred financial assets that is created or retained by the Group is recognised as a separate asset or liability.

The Group derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged, cancelled, or expire.

The Group also derecognises financial assets and financial liabilities when there has been significant changes to the terms and/or the amount of contractual payments to be received/paid.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Group has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

The Group classifies financial assets as loans and receivables.

The Group classifies financial liabilities as amortised cost.

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus directly attributable transaction costs.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market.

Loans and receivables are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

Loans and receivables comprise cash and cash equivalents, receivables and monetary recoverables.

Cash and cash equivalents represent highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into a known amount of cash with an insignificant risk of changes in value, with maturities of 3 months or less.

Impairment of non-derivative financial assets

Financial assets are assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is objective evidence that it is impaired. A financial asset is impaired if there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the asset, and that the loss event(s) had an impact on the estimated future cash flows of that asset that can be estimated reliably.

Impairment of non-financial assets

The carrying amounts of the Group's non-financial assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

Leases

Classification and treatment

Leases in terms of which the Group assumes substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases.

The Group currently has no finance leases.

Operating leases

Leases that are not finance leases are classified as operating leases.

Operating leases are not recognised in the Group's statement of financial position. Payments made under operating leases are recognised in surplus or deficit on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised as an integral part of the total lease expense, over the term of the lease.

Statement of Cash Flows

Operating activities include amounts received from provision of services, investment income and other income sources and payments to employees and suppliers to manage the day-to-day operations of the Group.

Investing activities are those related to the purchase and disposal of investments and property, plant and equipment and intangibles.

Financing activities comprise loans and borrowings.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All items in the financial statements are exclusive of GST, with the exception of Sundry Receivables and Accounts Payables which are inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

The Society is registered as a charity under the Charities Services and as such is exempt from the payment of Income Tax.

The Society has taken legal advice that Aotearoa Kapa Haka Limited will also be regarded as a non taxable charitable entity as it operates solely in furtherance of the Society's objectives.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, Plant and equipment are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation or amortisation is provided on a diminishing value basis on all items at the following rates:

The cost of Mahau is 50% of its construction price to the other joint venturer, being the cost of labour and materials. Mahau is not depreciated as its residual value is considered to exceed its cost.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Opinion



However, Te Matatini ki te Ao left us dissatisfied with the inconsistencies of the current judging system and that the arena to present the best showcase of kapa haka was not fit for purpose. Being susceptible to the vagaries of weather and technical issues makes us question whether Te Matatini is seriously focussed on the art form. The advent of 2021 being at another sports stadium means more of the same.

While we crave the innovation, excitement and beauty of Te Matatini we must give serious thought to how we honour the art form of kapa haka.

The return of Te Kapa Haka o Te Whānau a Kai seniors after an absence of over 5 years provided impact and earned the roopu second place at Tamararo, plus qualifying to Te Matatini ki Te Ao.

The Tairāwhiti Primary Schools Kapa haka festival attracts over 70 roopu each year and is represented by primary schools, kohanga reo, play centres and childcare centres. The event attracts over 3,000 performers and is held in November over 5 days at the Gisborne Showgrounds Events Centre. The highlight is a mass kapa haka performance at the conclusion of the hui

Kapa Haka Growth

The growth of kapa haka is based around the annual Tamararo Kapa haka Competition. In this period the following numbers are provided in respect of participation

This will provide a comprehensive overview of the current status of kapa haka in Tairāwhiti and will be the focus of wānanga to determine sound outcomes in all areas from 2019 and beyond.



TE ARAWA – Dan Vaka

Key Highlights

- One of Te Arawa's highlights for the year was proudly having 6 Kapa Haka representing at Te Matatini ki te Ao in Te Whanganui a Tara with 3 of those Kapa making 'Matangirua' - Top 9.
- Te Arawa Kapa Haka Committee were proud to be able to financially support all 6 Kapa competing at Te Matatini by applying for and receiving funding to assist with each Kapa's campaign for Te Matatini.
- The development & implementation of a Te Arawa judging training platform has this year seen more younger judges come through to acquire and develop judging skills beginning at Primary Regional level, Secondary Schools Regional level, through to National School levels and Senior Regional level(s).

Rohe Events



This momentous occasion will be recorded in history as the first kapa haka consisting of raukura from Te Kohanga Reo and kura kaupapa Māori representing Hoani Waititi Marae becoming the inaugural champions of the Ngāpō Pimia Wehi Duncan McIntyre taonga whakamau mahara. Kāore i kō atu, kāore i kō mai!

Rohe Events

- July 2018: Preparations from the kura tuarua representing Tamaki at the NZ secondary schools national kapa haka festival in Rangitāne.
- July 2018: Te Taumata Kapa Haka hosted Waihirere in a showcase of wahine rangatira in te ao haka over many years.
- September 2018: Tamaki Kapa haka, Auckland Council and mana whenua host Te Matatini executive committee on a tour of potential venues for Te Matatini 2021.
- October 2018: Te Ahurea Tino Rangātiratanga
- Te Wā O Te Raumati: Preparations for Te Matatini ki te Ao by Ngā Tumanako, Te Waka Huia, Te Manu Huia, Te Taha Tu and Te Roopu Manutaki.
- November 2018: Qualifying regionals for Mana Kuratahi. Six kura will travel to Tainui in November 2019 to represent Tamaki Makaurau.
- March 2019: Polyfest. Division one was postponed due to Christchurch mosque massacre and resulted in another successful event. 2020 may be the last time the Māori stage is part of the Polyfest due to the whenua it is held on being developed for housing and conflicts with the management of Polyfest.

Kapa Haka Growth

- Tamaki Makaurau Senior Kapa haka regionals had a total of nineteen kapa haka, many the result of working directly with communities that are likely to host kapa haka in 2021.
- Wānanga held for more than 70 kura tuarua as they prepare for our two secondary school kapa haka festivals.
- Wānanga held for more than 40 kura tuarua prior to the regional competition.

The Main Goals for Our Rohe for 2018-2019

- Ngā Tumanako to continue the high standards when representing Te Matatini, Aotearoa, their own whānau, hapū and iwi as they travel internationally to Shanghai in November 2019 and Hawaii in March 2020.
- Sharing Te Mauri O Te Matatini with the marae of Tamaki Makaurau to engage communities and celebrate ngā korero o ngā tupuna.
- Coordinating a wānanga for te reo me ōna tikanga training for a 1,000+ volunteer workforce for Te Matatini 2021.
- Provide wānanga for a Tamaki Makaurau Kapa Haka mass kapa haka performance at events of significance leading up to Te Matatini 2021.



NGĀ KAPA HAKA KURA TUARUA O AOTEAROA 2018

He rākaukawa nō Hekenukumai ki te haka, he rākaukawa anō ki te mau rākau. Koia te taituarā tuatahi o Te Matatini. Nōna ngā pūkenga hangā piriti i tu ai te ātamira mō te whakatāetae ā motū i tū ki Ōkara Park. Nōnata ake nei i oti i a ia he taurira ki te hanga ātamira e tareka ai te tōtō ki te motu.

Nō te tau 2019 i whakawahia ia hai Ta o Aotearoa ki Waitangi. Nōna e kaumātua ana i te hangā piriti tonu ia, he piriti tāngata hai whakakotahi i ngā iwi o Te Moana-nui-ā-Kiwa, otrā te ao. I kitea nūita tēnei i te whatinga mai o tai mihi tāngata ki runga ki a ia i tana tangihanga.

He hanga pūri nō Hekenukumai i te kaha nui o tana māui, kihai ia i tae ki Te Matatini ki te Ao. Nā kona i whakatūngia Te Toki Nui o Kupe e Te Matatini ki te Ao; Muriwhenua, Te Puu Ao, Hātea me te Waitangi Cultural Society he pō whakangahau mō te uri o Te Uri o Hina me Te Rarawa.

Nō te 11 o Mei 2019 i huta ake e Ta Hekenukumai Ngaiwi Puhipi tana punga me te whakātere ki Hawaiki pāmamao,

E te tohunga tāraiwaka. Kua mānuu tō waka ki te pō ei





Hai tana "he kaihanga piriti noa iho a ia"; Hai tohu maumaharanga ki tēna, e rārangī haere nei te tini o ngā piriti i te Taitokerau, nāna. Ina noa atu ōna whakatutukitanga i whakawhiwhia ki a ia ki te Tohu Ta o Aotearoa – Ta Hekenukumai Ngaiwi Puhipi.

I hau tōna rongo mō te whakarauora i te mahi whakaterewa waka a te Māori. I pau katōa i a te Moana-nui-a-Kiwa te haere me ngā motutapu te haere me te toru āmīotanga ōna i Te Ika ā Māui atu i te tau 1992.

E ai ki te kōrero e 52 ngā waka taua nāna i whao. Ko Te Whare Wānanga ā Kupe Waka kai Te Aūre, tana mahinga nui. Nā te tohea ōna te pāpātanga ki te mate, ana, i kitea ōna whatu te puāwaitanga o tōna whare wānanga.

Ko tōna whāinga ko te whāngai i te kai mārō e pā ana ki te whakaterewa waka me te kōkōrangī. I kaha tana whakapono, me whakaako tēnei mātāuranga, hai a ia he uho tēnei mātāuranga nō te ahurea o Aotearoa. Ko tā te whare wānanga nei he whakatairanga i te mahi a te waka hourua ki te kawē iwi ki Aotearoa, otrā Poronihia, Mikoronihia me Meranīhia.

E rua kiromita i tētahi rori puehu ka tae ake ki tētahi wahi māhorahora. Ki te taha o tētahi hiwi kei reira he karati, he whare whakairo me tētahi waka hourua e ūhia ana ki te tāpōrena me tētahi whare e anga atu ana ana ki Doubtless Bay. Kua whakarahi ake o roto i ngā tau.

He pou rāhui kai runga i te hiwi. Ana kai roto e noho ana a Hekenukumai i tana tūru i te taha o tana kātā hahu pōro. Kātahi te tīrohananga whakamiharo atu i Te Aūre. He porowhita te pou rāhui, he kāpēhu hoki. Kua wehea ia pou 32 kia 11 waene te tawhiti e tohu ana i tētahi anganga. Ina tīmata a Ta Hekenukumai ki te tāhurihuri i tana tūru, i konā e mārāma ai te kitea kua hangāia e ia he kāpēhu hai mātāi i ngā pō o te rangi. Nā konā hoki i whakangungu i tana mahi kōkōrangī me te tātai whētū, te pānui i te rā, ngā ao me ngā tohu o te taiāo ki te whakau i ngā wānanga o te kimi whenua.

I tīmata te whai wahi o Hekenukumai ki ngā mahi waka i tana taitaohinga nōna e kaihōe ana i a Ngātōkīmatawhaorua. Nō te tau 1985, nō te ūnga maitanga o Hōkūle'al hai reira i tākiritā tana mahi whakarauora i te mahi whakaterewa waka. Ko reira anō i takoto i a Ta Hēmi Hēnare te mānuka me hoki anō te iwi Māori ki te mahi whakaterewa waka. I tutuki i te tekau tau i muri mai i te hahau-tanga i a Ta Hekenukumai o tētahi waka me tōna whakaterenga anō hoki.

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
