Matatini- Tā Selwyn Parata KNZM

Knighthood celebrated by Te Matatini, He wīwī, he Naati, he whanokē.

"We celebrate with the Parata whānau this great honour bestowed on Selwyn Tanetoa Parata," said Carl Ross Chief Executive of Te Matatini. Mataoro - Te Toa Whakaihuwaka

Ngāpo Pīmia Wehi Duncan MacIntyre trophy Overall winner

This trophy is awarded to the winner of Te Matangirua, Finals Day competition. Crowned this year, Te Toa Whakuihuwaka is Te Kapa Haka o Te Whānau a Apanui. The trophy was donated by Duncan MacIntyre, Minister of Māori Affairs 1969-72, 1975-78

Rt Hon Duncan MacIntyre was the Minister of Māori Affairs during the first festival in 1972. At that time, there was a resurgence and revival of Māori language traditions, especially among rangatahi. The trophy was donated to promote the pursuit of excellence by rangatahi in Te Reo Māori and its traditions.
